














#### Boop the Snoot

Messner, nonfiction author extraordinaire, offers a simple "how-to" on reading stories which ends at the beginning of a learning adventure.



A is for Angry: an Animal and Adjective Alphabet by Sandra Boynton A clever combo of letters and adjectives by a favorite author.

Ten On a Twig by Lo Cole How many colorful birds can actually fit on one skinny twig? Count along to strengthen color and number knowledge!

I'm Not Small by Nina Crews A boy is told to go outside and play and discovers he is tiny next to some things but huge next to others—a day of revelations!

I Know Numbers by Taro Gomi Colorfully shows the many ways numbers are in our everyday life.

Ten Cats by Emily Gravett Join in the color-splashing fun as ten cats make their mark by making art!

G Is for Goat by Patricia Polacco A sweet ABC book set on a goat farm—educational in more ways than one!

"The Nutshell Library" by Maurice Sendak A favorite series from a favorite author. Learn the alphabet, the months of the year, counting, and how to be wise. Check out the cartoon "Really Rosie" featuring the music of Carole King when you're done!

## Favorite Folktales

Bringing the Rain to Kapiti Plain by Verna Aardema A cumulative story whose rhythm is soothing and finally, when the rain comes at last, joyful. A classic of the African veldt.

Too Many Pigs and One Big Bad Wolf by Davide Cali A fun, mathematical spin on the traditional favorite story of wolf v. pigs!

Adelita: a Mexican Cinderella Story by Tomie DePaola So many cultures around the world have stories very similar to the familiar "Cinderella" story; try this from Mexico!

The Gingerbread Boy by Richard Eglieski A fun citified retelling of the traditional "gingerbread boy" story, only this time the cookie-come-to-life romps through New York City!

The Girl Who Loved Wild Horses by Paul Goble This Caldecott Medal winning book tells of a girl who loves her family, but who prefers to be among the wild horses where she can feel freedom.

Anansi retold by Gerald McDermott The "spider-man" Anansi is a popular folklore character around the world & we at SMES love reading about him and acting out his antics!

Baby Rattlesnake retold by Te Ata, adapted by Lynn Moroney This ancient tale of the Chickasaw tells of a baby rattlesnake who wishes for and is granted something before he is quite ready for it. A classic.

by Laurel Snyder, illus. by Dan Santat In this sophisticated picture book, you'll get to choose and rechoose how favorite tales end! Entertainment for hours!

Lon Po Po: a Red Riding Hood Story from China retold by Ed Young A visually stunning version of a familiar story, but set in ancient China.

# Nonfiction & poetry Favorites

Twenty Questions by Mac Barnett A fun exploration of thinking about thinking and questioning the questions...you won't be able to put it down!

The Universe in You by Jason Chin Go beyond what the eye can see and explore God's wonders in the particles visible only with powerful microscopes. Prepare to be amazed!

A Summer Treasury of Recipes, Crafts, and Wisdom by Angela Ferraro-Fanning One of the new series called "Little Homesteaders" that shares kidfriendly ways of doing things from long ago. There's one for each season!

Spaceblock by Chritopher Franceschelli A really neat intro to outer space, facts and history of humans in it—all packaged into a nifty board book with flaps to lift over and over!

Pretend Soup and Other Real Recipes by Mollie Katzen Beloved restauranteur and cookbook author Katzen describes her amazing discovery that her own toddlers were cooking (for real) in preschool!

Roots, Shoots, Buckets & Boots by Sharon Lovejoy There is always a place for gardening in a young one's life! Start small and grow big—the rewards are so worth it!

Now We Are Six by A. A. Milne Milne, who introduced the world to Winnie the Pooh, also wrote several books of poetry. Try the one with illustrations by Rosemary Wells!

A Seed Grows by Antoinette Portis What a perfect time to read about a sunflower go from seed to seed!

Saint Spotting, or, How to Read a Church by Christopher Raschka A little boy (the author as a child, perhaps?) and his mother go through a church, where the boy shares all he has learned about the geography of a church and many common saint images. Super sweet and very handy.
